Children tripping or falling during self-led exploration of collections in museum space.	Scrapes or cuts from glass display cases, or stone objects.	Children are given instructions not to run. Children are broken up into two groups for crowd control.	Adult supervision at all times.
Children tripping or falling when walking to the classroom from the museum across the site.	Scrapes or cuts from falling on the hard ground or gravel surfaces.	Children are made to walk in a single line with teachers supervising.	Adult supervision at all time.
Children working with printmaking materials such as inks and rollers.	Ingesting ink or getting ink in their eyes from fingers or splattering from the rollers.	Children are supervised at all times and given instruction on the use of equipment.	Adult supervision at all times. Wipes are readily available. A sink and soap are available.
